Greeting from the CEO

As COVID-19 restrictions began to lift across Alberta over the past year, we were once again able to offer in-person programming. Our youth were thrilled to get back to interacting with their peers and engaging with the local communities.



Here is some key information about 4-H Alberta member participation for the 2020/2021 Club Year. 4-H Alberta registered 296 clubs, 5,600 members, and 2,500 leaders and volunteers. While 4-H Alberta's membership declined by 339 members, we worked hard to reverse this decline. Now, 4-H Alberta continues to lead 4-H across the country in membership retention throughout this long-lasting pandemic.

Thankfully, our community has never given up on finding new and creative ways to serve our youth during challenging times like these. Together, our community earned AHS exemptions, overhauled and relaunched youth development programs, and ran summer camps to continue to serve our youth. As a parent watching my children live through continued disruption, I want to thank everyone in our community for pushing forward and creating some stability and community for our youth across Alberta.

4-H Alberta was able to continue delivering meaningful and engaging programming both virtually and in-person. Thanks to sponsors, supporters, and donors like you, we have been able to continue to set our youth up for success and to strengthen our local communities across the province. We look forward to seeing what the next year will bring!

May 2021 was a big month for us, as 4-H Alberta announced the appointment of our first elected

board members since 4-H Alberta's 2020 restructure. The announcement was made at our Annual General Meeting on May 29, 2021. Five area directors were elected by the Area, while the 4-H Alberta Board of Directors chose five diversity directors. The appointments were made based on business acumen, competency, skills, diversity, and geography and voted in by the membership across Alberta.



October 2021: We worked hard to streamline and simplify the registration process for our club leaders and members and, as such, have partnered with Staples to receive support with the 4-H Alberta club supplies. In partnership with Staples, supplies were distributed to the 285 registered clubs.

November 2021: Over 220 scholarships were awarded, including five newly established ones. 4-H Alberta teamed up with new partners to increase support of youth and all provincial programs.

Although it has not been an easy year for many across Alberta, I am pleased to report our strong results and progress. Together, we continue to find ways to provide 4-H's excellent opportunities to our incredible community.

4-H ALBERTA COMMUNITY REPORT

Message from Andy Pittman, Chair 2021 Board of Directors

The first-ever 4-H Alberta Board of Directors was elected at the Annual General Meeting on May 29, 2021. The new board took over from the interim board which had been overseeing 4-H Alberta since March 2020. It is important to note the substantial work that was done by the interim board on a great number of details, allowing the new board to settle into its role. This small interim group is once again thanked for their significant volunteer contributions to the advancement of the new 4-H Alberta.

The new board elected 11 directors, including five area directors and five diversity directors, based on the skill sets they brought to the board. One youth director was also elected to complete the board, a significant addition ensuring that a youth voice will always sit at the table to provide invaluable insight from a member's perspective.

There was a great deal of work to continue from the interim board's committees. In addition to the Executive Committee, five committees were continued: Audit and Finance, Governance and Nominating, Scholarship, Programs and Growth, and People and Resources. And, a sixth committee was created: the Community Engagement Committee. This committee consisted of all the area directors and was established to ensure consistent communication among the five Areas and their Regional Councils.

The board also created the first Strategic Plan for the new 4-H Alberta. This allowed the mapping out of a mission and vision, as well as values, principles, and strategic priorities (growth, business excellence, innovative programming, and legacy). This Strategic Plan should provide the road map for stability and growth in the years ahead and will be adapted as priorities evolve.

The Governance Committee engaged the regions in a discussion about the potential for alignment of regional bylaws. Initial timetables were adjusted as discussions continued, and it was eventually determined, in respect of everyone's valuable time, that regions could take the perspective gained from these discussions into consideration in their normal timetables when reviewing their bylaws. However,

much constructive feedback was gained through the process, and the time spent on these discussions was greatly appreciated.

The 4-H Alberta Board put significant work into a governance framework that has been adopted to assist in running a board that functions in a true governance system and style. This is a system that functions quite differently from the more traditionally operational governance style that is seen at other levels of 4-H within the province, so the board has worked hard to practice and sustain this form of governance. We have enlisted the assistance of numerous professionals for governance training and advice. Other tools include a board work plan and a self-assessment to ensure we identify potential gaps and areas for improvement.

We are in regular communication with 4-H Canada regarding policies and practices being discussed at the national level and across the country. We also welcome new trustees to oversee the separate Alberta 4-H Foundation entity, and much thanks go to the interim trustees for their dedication to the oversight of the foundation.

We are very pleased to continue our strong association with our main sponsor and partner, the Government of Alberta. We also want to acknowledge the wonderful support of so many incredible sponsors who provide funding for 4-H Alberta initiatives. It is greatly appreciated. Our wonderful and dedicated staff continued working very hard for the community, and persevered through challenging times to provide creative programming and ongoing support for the clubs in our province.

As a proud 105-year-old organization, the new structure has provided some challenges and numerous successes. We strive to always be and do better every day, and we look forward to developing and continuing the strong connections with the amazing members and leaders of our great 4-H community. It is because of your continued passion and involvement that 4-H continues to be such an excellent youth development program. On behalf of 4-H Alberta, thank you.

4-H Alberta Year in Review:



JANUARY 1, 2021 - DECEMBER 31, 2021

We can probably all agree that 2021 was an "interesting" year, with the world facing continued restrictions from the pandemic and various other disasters. But we didn't let that stop us from carrying out our programs here at 4-H Alberta – and despite a few difficulties along the way, we're proud of what we achieved, along with our members, leaders, volunteers, supporters, and partners.

Let's run through a quick refresher and celebration of everything that happened last year.

Between January and March 2021, 4-H Alberta continued to host a mixture of virtual and in-person programs to keep its members engaged and connected throughout the pandemic. This included holding our first virtual Provincial Public Speaking Competition - exclusively supported by AltaLink - over Zoom in April.

May was a big month for us, as we announced the appointment of our first elected board members since 4-H Alberta's 2020 restructure. The announcement was made at our Annual General Meeting on May 29, 2021. Five Area Directors were elected by the Area, while the Board of Directors chose five Diversity Directors. The appointments were made based on business acumen, competency, skills, diversity, and geography.

As summer approached, things started to look up, and the lifting of COVID-19 restrictions across the Province of Alberta meant we were able to offer inperson summer programming at a limited capacity in July and August. We were able to host 22 4-H Alberta Programs (day camps, overnight camps, shows, and virtual options). 715 Members, 53 Youth Leaders, and 6 Summer Staff participated at 13 different locations.

4-H Alberta has some amazing members and they come from all different backgrounds and different ages: our very own 4-H Alberta Member, Aubrey F. took the stage at the Minister of Agriculture's 2021 Calgary Stampede Agri-Food Economic Recovery Reception in July 2021. This amazing 9-year-old took the stage and courageously spoke to people—including Premier Kenny—with authority and passion.

We are extremely proud of our Communications program and the opportunities it provides for our Members.

In September 2021, we selected our 4-H Alberta Scholarship and Elmer and Ona Hansen Memorial Fund Scholarship recipients. As always, we had a large number of applicants which shows how important 4-H Alberta's scholarship program is for our youth. Following the selections in September, we distributed over 220 scholarships in November, including five brand new Provincial Scholarships:

- Chuck Groeneveld Memorial 4-H Scholarship
- Marilyn Sharp 4-H Scholarship
- Wolf Carbon Solutions 4-H Scholarship
- Wolf Future Leaders 4-H Scholarship
- ***** Wright Family Scholarship

Then, in October, 296 clubs registered for the year and we sent club supplies to them in partnership with Staples - another first in the history of 4-H Alberta.

In November we also welcomed 10 newly selected 4-H Alberta Ambassadors who are enthusiastic 4-H Senior Members and are driven to grow 4-H in Alberta through sharing their 4-H experiences and representing 4-H youth!

And last but not least, let's not forget about the Virtual Hall of Fame Awards ceremony that took place in November. The 2019 Hall of Fame inductees included Sally Barkwell and Leora "Lee" Carouthers while the 2020 Hall of Fame inductees included Andy Pittman and Stacy Price. We are also pleased to announce the 2021 Alberta Hall of Fame Inductee, Lorraine Parkinson. The 4-H Alberta Hall of Fame honours Albertans who have made exceptional contributions to the 4-H program in this province as a volunteer through outstanding leadership and have significantly impacted 4-H youth and our leaders.

All in all, it was a successful year. Here's to the next one!

- Members were provided with recipes and made 'ice cream in a bag', live over Zoom.
- Members were encouraged to upload pictures of their submissions into the contest folder for a chance to win a prize.

The Science of Food: Ice Cream in a Bag

Materials:

- 1tbsp sugar
- ½ cup half and half cream (Alternative: heavy whipping cream)
- ¼ tsp vanilla extract
- ½ cup salt (Any salt will work but coarser salts like rock salt works best)
- One sturdy small sealable bag (ex. Ziploc)
- One gallon-size sealable bag (ex. Ziploc)
- 4 cups of ice
- Oven mitts or a small towel

COMMUNICATIONS AND ENGAGEMENT



Public speaking is one of the world's most common fears, and something that many people never get over, no matter how old they are. Yet in April 2021, a group of almost 360 brave young people took part in the 4-H Alberta Public Speaking Competition to master the skill.

The event, which was possible thanks to the support from our exclusive 4-H Alberta Communications and Public Speaking sponsor AltaLink, was 4-H Alberta's first live and virtual Provincial Public Speaking Competition. The program was reimagined due to COVID-19 and our aim was to help young 4-H members improve their confidence and poise by giving them a chance to deliver speeches and presentations to an audience. This is an experience that will stand them in good stead well into the future as they attend job interviews and enter the working world.

145 junior members, 135 intermediate members, and 79 senior members participated in the program, and it's fair to say they surpassed our expectations with their incredible performances. Although only the top 10 senior members advanced to the final competition, we're incredibly proud of all those who got involved. Not only did they overcome their nerves to master a difficult skill, but they displayed significant resilience and determination by adapting to COVID-19 restrictions throughout the club year, and embracing virtual program delivery.

So, it's a huge thank you from us to AltaLink and all of our volunteers, who help make amazing experiences like our Communications Program possible. Now, watch this space for the next one!

UFA Outdoor Education Kitchen

When we sent out our first ever year-end giving appeal to fund an educational outdoor kitchen facility for young people in 2021, we were unsure of what the outcome would be. However, we were humbled by the generosity of our community, and we're thrilled to announce that we didn't just reach our goal – we exceeded it. In total, we **raised \$49,186**, in huge part thanks to **UFA Cooperative Ltd.**'s pledge to match all other donations.

The funding will go toward building an **educational outdoor kitchen facility** at the Alberta 4-H Centre, which we plan to use for teaching young people about agriculture, local food production, and their role in bringing communities together. It's set to become the home for all kinds of agricultural education programs, alongside guest speaker events, collaborative projects, and community gatherings.

In other words, it will become a place for purposeful learning opportunities and a central gathering place to foster lifelong relationships.

Unfortunately, the ground breaking has been delayed due to supply chain and construction timing issues. but construction is slated to begin in 2023, and we can't wait to see the project in action soon.

2021 FortisAlberta Bee Condo & Birdhouse

2021, 4-H Alberta and FortisAlberta joined forces to carry out a virtual Bee Condo & Birdhouse Workshop, which educated participants on the importance of solitary bees and local birds and how to care for them. The webinar was presented by Kelly Weatherall, a Senior Maintenance Planner from FortisAlberta, and formed part of the Environment & Healthy Living leadership development pillar.

Throughout the session, participants learned how the species are needed to maintain and balance the environment and the role of birdhouses and bee condos in keeping the animals safe. However, the main focus was on how to build these types of structures, keeping their respective habitat preferences in mind. Participants designed a creation using a coloring sheet, but they also received the materials needed to build their own structures, and they brought them to life after the webinar finished.

Later, they submitted pictures of their completed birdhouse and/ or bee condos.



2021 Save-On-Foods

THE ENVIRONMENT & HEALTHY LIVING

With the cost of living rising, it's becoming harder than ever to follow a healthy and nutritious diet – yet obesity and diseases are becoming increasingly prevalent issues, even among children. Part of the problem lies in a lack of knowledge on how to prepare the right meals, so 4-H Alberta and popular supermarket chain Save-On-Foods teamed up to hold a webinar on healthy cooking and eating.

In June 2021, a group of 4-H members in Alberta attended a virtual cooking experience with Jennifer, a Registered Dietitian with Save-On-Foods. They learned a special oat snack bite recipe, which is the perfect example of a meal that's quick and easy but also nutritious and affordable – and best of all, the participants got to make their own version of this delicious treat from their own kitchens, while receiving feedback and recommendations from Jennifer.

Jennifer also educated members about how to make healthy choices, including outlining potential recipe substitutions and explaining how different foods benefit growing bodies in different ways. 
